Philanthropist Recognizes Humanistic Doctors Leonard Tow Honored

With a surprise birthday gift to Leonard Tow, his family has secured the future of the *Leonard Tow Humanism in Medicine Awards*. These awards are presented annually to a graduating medical student and outstanding role-model faculty member at nearly 80 of the 126 U.S. medical schools.

The Arnold P. Gold Foundation initiated the awards in 1991 at the Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons to recognize those who excel at patient care as well as in science.

A Living Tribute

In 2003, the awards were renamed the *Leonard Tow Humanism in Medicine Awards* and endowed with a three million dollar gift to The Gold Foundation in honor of Leonard Tow's exemplary leadership and commitment to fostering social justice, innovative medical research and humanism in medicine. At the Columbia P & S 2003 commencement, Dean Gerald Fischbach presented the *Arnold P. Gold Foundation Guardian of Humanism in Medicine Award* to Leonard Tow for his role in perpetuating the Humanism in Medicine Awards throughout the nation.

Tow, a life-long student and teacher, is Chairman and CEO of Citizens Communications, a noted philanthropist, educator, media pioneer and humanist. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree and an Honorary Doctorate from Brooklyn College, Master of Arts and Ph.D. degrees from Columbia University, and has taught at Columbia, Hunter and Brooklyn Colleges and New York University. Mr. Tow serves on the Boards of several arts and cultural organizations, including Lincoln Center Theatres, American Ballet Theatre and Young Concert Artists. A role model for many, Leonard Tow has lived his life demonstrating great compassion and empathy for others. These awards are a living tribute to the life and career of Leonard Tow.

Fifteen Years of Advancing Compassionate Care

Fifteen years ago, The Arnold P. Gold Foundation began its work to nurture and preserve the tradition of the caring physician. The programs we create and support are designed to influence the way a physician is educated from the first day of medical school through residency and entrance into the hospital culture. Students and faculty at more than 93% of the nation's 145 schools of medicine and osteopathy, as well as at schools abroad, are involved in at least one of our 26 programs. *In 2003, the Foundation provided more than a million dollars for program services thanks* to the incredible generosity of our donors. Highlights include:

The Gold Humanism Honor Society (GHHS) is proliferating on campuses throughout the country. In just three years, close to one-third of our nation's medical schools have or are in the process of establishing a chapter to honor fourth-year medical students, residents and faculty members who are exemplars of humanistic patient care. We received a third significant grant to support the *GHHS* from our visionary funding partner, The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.

The White Coat Ceremony (WCC), a rite of passage for beginning medical students, which focuses on caring for the patient, was created by The Gold Foundation and established first at the Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons. Since 1993, 135 medical schools in the U.S. and abroad have instituted this Gold Foundation signature program, or similar event.

15 Years of Advancing Compassionate Care

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Student Summer Fellowships for Research in Community Health Issues afforded students from 16 schools of medicine an opportunity to investigate community health and cultural competency issues thanks to the Mellam Family Foundation and others. Sample projects included: "Ability of primary care physicians to effectively treat developmentally disabled adults"; "Effect of parental diabetic status on management of his/her child"; and "Patient and physician perspectives on obesity in rural Kansas."

Student, Faculty and Resident Initiated Grants for Promoting Humanism were funded at 10 schools and teaching hospitals for 13 diverse projects. They included: developing effective strategies for teaching human values to surgeons in training; use of an innovative "life-review" interview method to help teach third year students about understanding the whole patient; and studying the effects of condolence letters on the resident physician and the deceased patient's family.

Caring Hospital Communities (CHC) programs include model residency education programs focusing on communication skills and cultural competency at New Jersey teaching hospitals and the *CHC Resource Center* on the Gold Foundation's website: *www.humanism-in-medicine.org* at which innovative and humanistic hospital environments are profiled. *CHC* receives significant funding from the Healthcare Foundation of New Jersey.

Humanism and Excellence in Teaching Awards were presented to 120 role-model

residents during *Student Clinician's Ceremonies* for third year students beginning their hospital rotations at 21 medical schools with help from the Henry and Marilyn Taub Foundation.

A National Symposium on the "Barriers to Sustaining Humanism in Medicine" convened 50 Deans and other experts in medical education in 2003 to focus on Overcoming the Barriers: Enhancing the Culture of Medical Education, Assessing Humanistic Growth and Mission. The consensus of the participants was that humanism can and should be assessed and peer nomination tools are valid and reliable.

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
